

This stunning piece is inspired by the rich underwater world of the Maldives — the intricate, delicate coral forms and the beautiful colours of the multitudinous organisms that call it home.

Crafted with thousands of porcelain shards, Peled's dramatic sculpture comments on the issue of coral bleaching affecting the region, with striking bursts of colour against a stark white background reflecting hope for future regeneration.

Sewing, Embroidery, Weaving

Shiru is a self-taught seamstress with over 30 years of experience. A proud mother of four, she has been sewing almost all her life, starting with making dresses for herself as a teenager. With the help of Maldivian craftswomen, she learnt kasabu viyun, the traditional embroidery technique used to make the elaborate necklines of Maldivian libaas dresses.



Along with this increasingly rare art form. Shiru's creations include kinaari viyun (the woven threads on libaas sleeves) and rumaafalhi (the folded headpiece worn as a hair accessory). Resin art and resin jewelry is an addition she has incorporated with the kasabu braids for the modern day. She also sews entire libaas dresses and makes jewellery using kasabu braids. Shiru loves what she does and takes great pride in helping to revive age-old Maldivian skills like braiding and weaving.

She is also the founder of an art therapy project centred around embroidery art.



With a background in graphic design, Joule's interest spans craft, painting and design. Her work focuses on exploring different textures, from the weathered walls of cities to islands that have their own tales to tell. She is the co-founder of Anbalange, a women-led company encompassing design, craft, jewellery and sewing.
